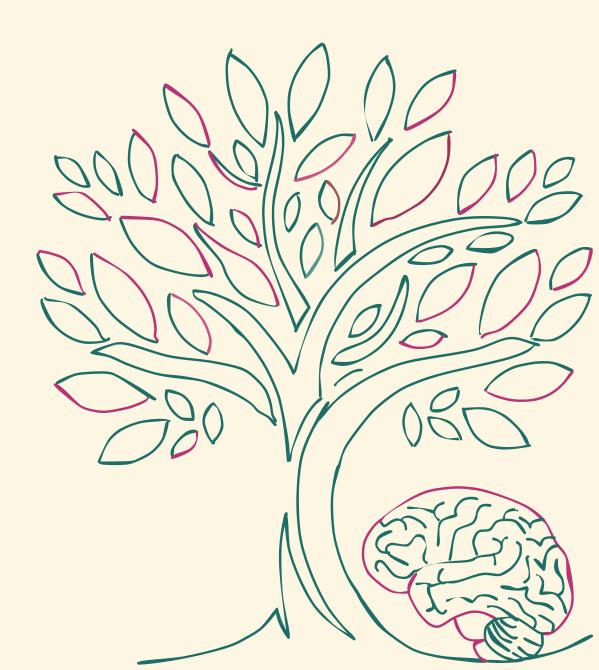

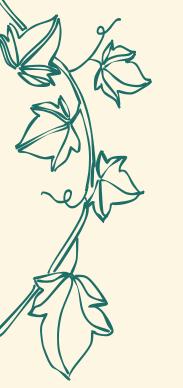

Sangath is a not-for-profit mental health research organisation dedicated to closing the treatment gap for mental health in India and beyond.

Founded in 1996 (Goa), Sangath is globally recognised for developing scalable, evidence-based care models grounded in community participation and cross-sector collaboration.

Our work drives community-centered mental health impact through world-class research, strategic partnerships, public engagement, service delivery, and innovative solutions tailored to low-resource settings.



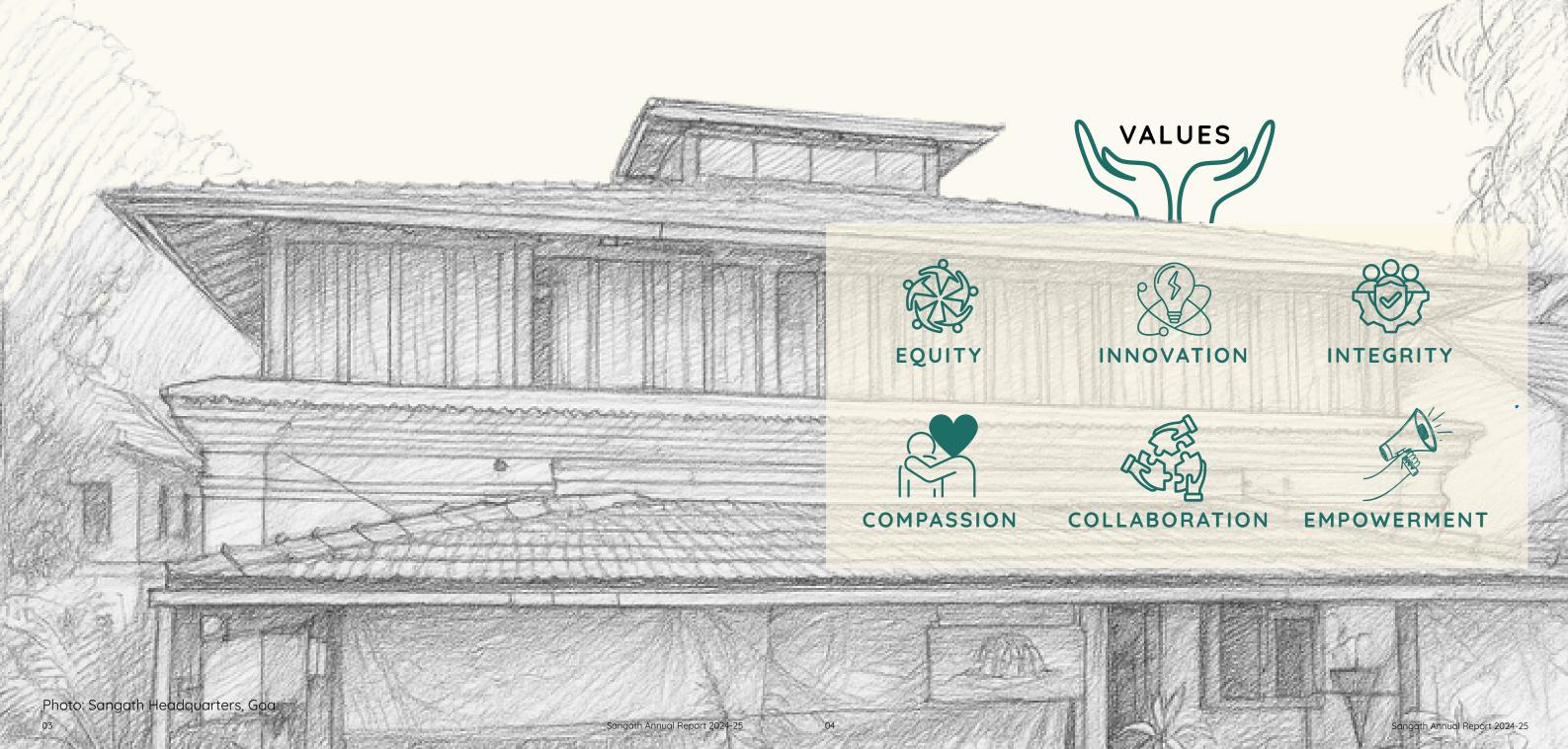

#### **MISSION**

At Sangath, our mission is to bridge the mental health treatment gap by empowering communities and leveraging public health systems to deliver affordable, evidence-based psychosocial care across the lifespan.



## SANGATH'S YEAR IN REVIEW



#### Delivery Innovations

We invest in innovative methods, technologies, and models to enhance the delivery of mental health interventions—focusing on building workforce capacities, leveraging digital solutions, and integrating services within existing health systems.

NAMASTE: Trained Anganwadi Workers in Delhi and Goa on developmental screening, awareness, and digital tools, strengthening early detection. NAMASTE screening identified children at risk of neurodevelopmental disorders, linking them to care pathways and targeted interventions like WHO-CST and PASS Plus.

**Khushee Mamta**: **Recruited and trained lay counsellors** in rural Rajasthan; collaborated with ASHA and Anganwadi workers to deliver community-based psychosocial support for perinatal depression.

**SAHARA**: Brought **Maternal Mental Health to the heart of communities** through powerful lived-experience videos, vibrant street plays, and striking wall paintings-sparking awareness and dialogue like never before.

**PEERS**: Developed and launched the **PEERS-supervision mobile application** & e-course for understanding its impact on the quality of therapy delivered by non-specialist community healthcare workers.

**PracticePal**: **Therapy-support chatbot** designed to function as therapy aid, incorporating HAP workbook content, psychoeducation videos, and automated homework reminders via Telegram/Textlt.

**SMHPP**: Orientation workshops were held for Heads from 500+ schools on mental health, stress management, and their roles under the POCSO Act. The **SEHER** intervention is now being adapted and evaluated for students in Tokyo, Japan and Bradford, UK.

**SHARP**: Pilot phase has been completed, comprising participants diagnosed with early-course schizophrenia or schizoaffective disorder.

**OPTIMIZED**: Strengthened partnerships with AIIMS Bhopal & NHM Madhya Pradesh; advanced **digital tool (Nubis App)** training and depression management.





We focus on the development, adaptation, and implementation of psychosocial and mental health interventions that address prevention, early detection, and treatment needs across diverse populations.

**CCAP**: Launched M-BIT, a digital intervention for hazardous drinking. Developed a common counselling manual integrating evidence-based strategies for harmful drinking.

**IMPRESS**: Designed a **5-module community intervention**, (LEARN, INFORM, ENGAGE, FOLLOW-UP, SELF-CARE) delivered by trained volunteers.

MADAD: Adapted and contextualised the **youth-friendly intervention**, "By Your Side", in Goa, using narrative and CBT techniques.

**SAATHI**: Developed the **Saathi Peer Support Manual** and conducted a participatory workshop with peer supporters, culminating in a dynamic panel discussion as part of the "Peer Support for Rights-Based Mental Health Care" initiative.

**COMPASS**: **Intervention adapted** from the evidence-based intervention PACT (Pre-school Autism Communication Trial), UK.

**MeWeSports**: **Trained community coaches** and **youth champions**, and adapted resources into Oriya, Konkani & Hindi.

**COINCIDE**: SPRING cohort team completed **Sweep 1 data collection in 600 households and Sweep 2 data collection in 572 households** through **mother-child assessments** by March 2025.

### Public Engagement

We foster awareness and dialogue on mental health by reducing stigma and building community capacity. Using creative platforms and participatory approaches, we promote inclusive conversations, empower communities, and normalize mental health care.

**AffirmCare**: Conducted consultations with **LGBTQIA+ stakeholders in Kerala**; delivered 8 workshops with faculty & students; partnered with local CBOs and State Health Systems Resource Center.

Access Matters: Conducted audits of 35 public health facilities in MP & Goa, to highlight the existing accessibility structures in public health facilities and formulate an action plan to make public health facilities more inclusive & accessible for people with disabilities.

Mahei x iHEAR: Strengthened psychological and economic resilience of 50 young women, queer & trans individuals through mental health workshops and indigenous skills training (handloom, bridal crafts) in Moirang district, Manipur.

**Creative Communion**: Used **art as a medium** to build safe community spaces for LGBTQIA+ and neurodivergent youth.

**National Symposium: iHEAR** co-hosted the "Advancing Queer and Disability Inclusion" Symposium with UChicago Delhi.

Leadership in Mental Health (LMH): The 16th edition of Sangath LMH Course brought together 70 passionate participants from 10 countries and a powerhouse faculty of over 50 global Mental Health Experts.

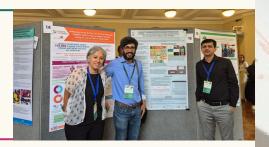

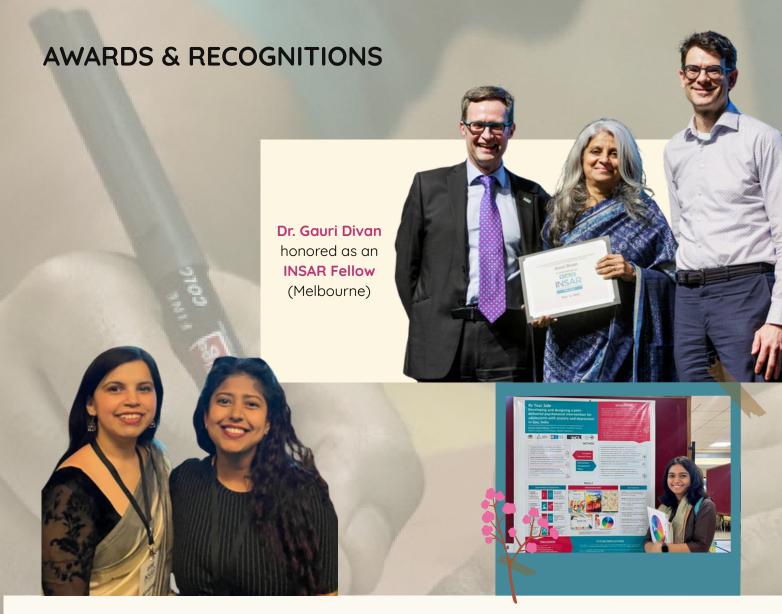

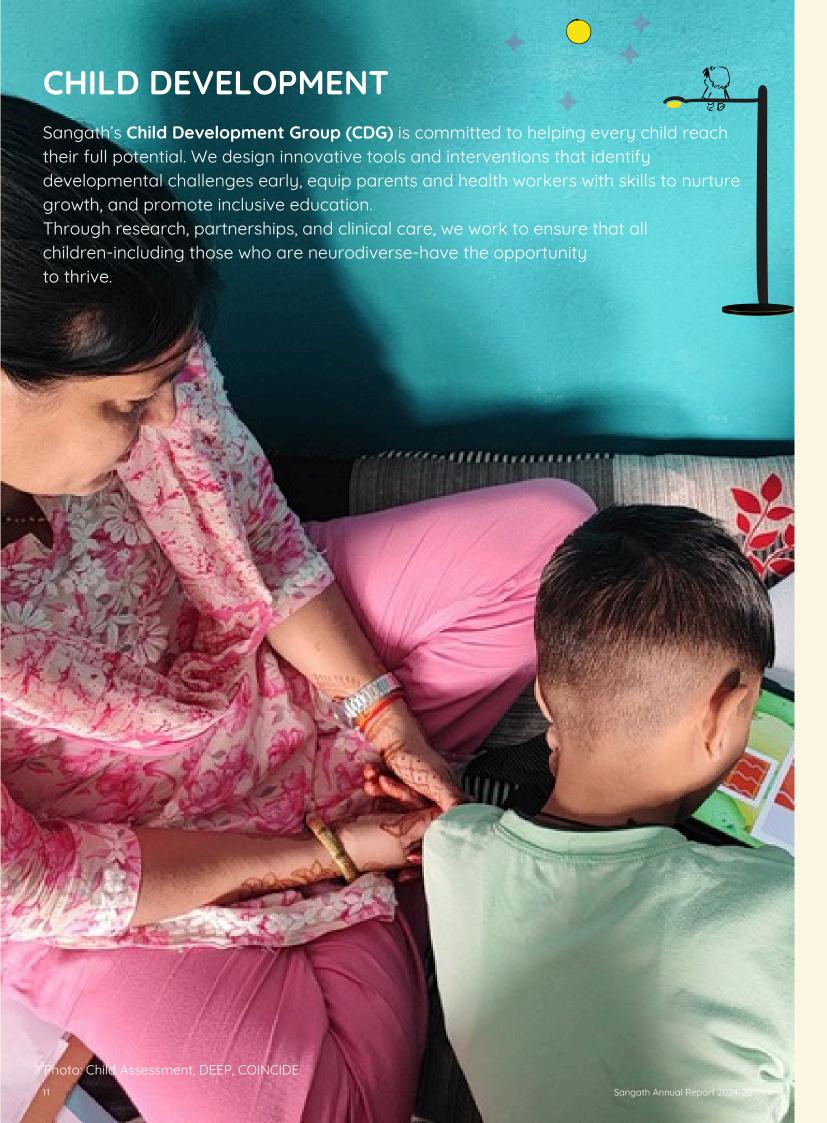

#### PROJECTS UNDER CDG

- NAMASTE: Aims to develop, implement, and evaluate a novel community-based pathway to support early detection and care for young children with Neurodevelopmental Disabilities (NDDs) in South Asia with a focus on Autism in India, Sri Lanka, and Nepal.
- **COMPASS**: The largest trial of its kind for autism in any low-and middle-income country setting. COMPASS aims to evaluate the effectiveness and costs associated with delivering the Parent mediated Autism Communication Intervention for Non-specialists Pluss (PASS Plus) in Delhi.
- **COINCIDE**: Aims to investigate the independent interaction and cumulative effects of nutritional, psychosocial and environmental factors on children's cognitive development and mental health in urban and rural India.
- **STREAM**: Aims to create a scalable tablet-based assessment tool for non-specialists to assess the development of children, aged 0-6 years, in the domains of attention and cognition, fine motor, and social skills in Delhi.

#### **COMMUNITY BASED HEALTH INITIATIVES**

Through the **NAMASTE** program, Sangath has been working to **strengthen our frontline workers- Anganwadi Workers (AWWs)**- so they can spot early signs of developmental delays in young children and connect families with timely care.

In Delhi and Goa, around **5% and 3% of children** respectively were found to have a high likelihood of Neurodevelopmental Disorders (NDDs), including Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). To support these children and their families, interventions like PASS Plus and WHO-Caregivers Skills Training (CST) are now being delivered across both sites—ensuring that screening leads to real support and stronger outcomes for children.

#### YEARLY HIGHLIGHTS

**COINCIDE:** The **SPRING cohort team** successfully completed Sweep 1 data collection in 600 households and Sweep 2 in 572 households through detailed mother-child assessments.

- In the COINCIDE study, the **Developmental Assessment on E-Platform (DEEP)** tool was deployed a gamified, digital tool that directly assesses cognition in young children and can be administered by frontline providers in community settings, addressing critical gaps in developmental surveillance.
- An in-person Initial Programme Theory (IPT) workshop was conducted, and SPRING cohort representatives from Sangath were invited to participate in the district-level 'Early Child Development' review and convergence meeting convened by the Civil Surgeon in Rewari, Haryana.
- The **COINCIDE team** presented papers and posters at various national and international conferences and shared mid-term updates at the India-Alliance Conclave.

**COMPASS:** Intervention adapted from the evidence-based intervention PACT (Pre-school Autism Communication Trial), UK; 12 sessions delivered to caregivers of autistic children aged 2-9 years.

STREAM: The STREAM digital tool was administered to a community sample of children under six years. The platform integrates multiple assessment components, including the Malawi Developmental Assessment Tool (MDAT), DEvelopmental Assessment on an E-Platform (DEEP), Screening Tool for Autism Risk using Technology (START), and parent questionnaires.

**NAMASTE:** Anganwadi Workers were trained in developmental screening tools, community awareness tools, and REDCap software.

- To support delivery, supervision, and case management of PASS Plus, a mobile and web
  application (in Hindi, English, and Marathi), was developed with technical partner Dimagi,
  and officially launched.
- Field implementation was initiated with formal MoUs in Goa & Delhi enabling integration of NAMASTE into government systems and Anganwadi networks. MoUs signed with the Department of Women and Child Development (DWCD) in Delhi and Goa, and with Directorate of Health Services (DHS) in Goa, to facilitate roll-out in the state. In Goa, doctors under the Rashtriya Bal Swasthya Karyakram (RBSK)- a National level government health program, were oriented to NAMASTE, enabling verification of cases flagged by AWWs.
- Dr. Anup Netravalkar (Sr. Program Coordinator, Goa) and S. Varuni (Program Coordinator, Delhi), achieved certification as Master Trainers in WHO-CST intervention. Further, orientations and consultations were conducted with DWCD senior officials, CDPOs, block coordinators, Anganwadi supervisors, and AWWs, including an 'Angan Baithak' (focus group discussion) to explore facilitators' challenges, and strategies for strengthening community-based screening.

# **ADOLESCENT & YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH**

We are driven by the vision of a world where every young person can access quality mental health care. Our work spans prevention, early detection, and care for challenges including depression, anxiety, suicide, and substance use.

Young people are central to every stage of our journey — guiding and co-creating solutions. We partner with schools, universities, and communities to deliver evidence-based interventions that build resilience and strengthen mental health. Through public engagement, we challenge stigma, and through capacity building, we empower lasting change.

#### PROJECTS UNDER AYMH

**METROPOLIS:** Advancing the understanding of the effectiveness and mechanisms of peer delivered psychological interventions, specifically problem solving and behavioral activation, as early interventions for youth depression in Delhi/ NCR.

**SMHPP:** School Mental Health Promotion Program is a scale up of SEHER intervention which improves school climate for prevention, promotion and redressal of Mental Health, in government-run primary/secondary and low cost private schools in Pimpri Chinchwad and Pune.



**MADAD:** Aims to adapt and test the feasibility and acceptability of a community-based, peer-facilitated psychological treatment for adolescents, aged 15–18 years, with anxiety and depression in India, Goa.

**MeWeSports:** A community-based program that uses sports as a platform to strengthen adolescent mental health and prevent substance use in Goa.

**PRESENCE:** A school-based implementation project that adopts a whole-school approach, engaging adolescents, teachers, principals, school management committees, and the wider community to build awareness on critical issues of adolescent mental health in Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh.

#### **COMMUNITY BASED HEALTH INITIATIVES**

Through **MADAD** and **MeWeSports** initiatives, Sangath has been equipping young people, families, and communities with knowledge and skills to better understand and respond to the challenges around substance use and mental health.

Adolescents have received psychoeducation sessions on substance use, mental health, and related problems, alongside other skill-building modules that help them manage stress and strengthen resilience. Additionally, the families were supported through literacy sessions-enabling them to recognise warning signs and provide support to the adolescents at home.

Similarly, **STRIDE** (intramural) **empowered youth to take the lead—designing and delivering their own awareness campaigns on mental health**. This youth-led model not only ensures contextual relevance but also builds ownership, creativity, and leadership among young people.

#### YEARLY HIGHLIGHTS

**MADAD:** Formative research completed through in-depth interviews with 17 adolescents.

- Intervention "By Your Side" a youth-friendly, culturally informed intervention using narrative and Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) techniques- developed and contextualized for Goa.
- 15 Peer Facilitators (18-21 years) are selected & trained for pilot delivery.
- Collaboration with Parvatibai Chowgule College of Arts and Sciences to train psychology students as peer facilitators in Goa.
- Awarded best poster presentation for presenting the paper on "By your Side" at AHMCON 2024 (Asia Pacific Conference on Adolescent Mental Health), held at MAHE.

**MeWeSports:** Community coaches and youth champions were trained, while teachers participated in awareness and capacity-building sessions. To **enhance accessibility, intervention materials were adapted into Oriya, Konkani, and Hindi.** Building on insights from the first pilot study conducted in Goa, the intervention was refined. **Two new grants were secured to expand the MeWeSports program across schools and communities in both Goa and Bhubaneswar.** This expansion was made possible through strategic partnerships — with the Diocesan Society of Education and Forca Goa Foundation for school and community-based delivery in Goa, and with Pro Sport Development for regional implementation in Bhubaneswar.

**METROPOLIS:** The first phase centered on **co-designing adaptations to peer-delivered interventions for problem-solving and behavioral activation**. Participatory workshops were held with Delhi University students (aged 18–24 years). In addition, 12 youth advisors contributed to study design, interpretation of findings, and final intervention planning.

- To prepare for the forthcoming trial, a provisional set of tools was reviewed, culturally adapted, and tested through a structured validation process, with a reference sample of 200 students participating in a psychometric study.
- A cohort of student peer supporters (Saathis) is being prepared to deliver METROPOLIS interventions. In partnership with Youth Mental Health Foundation (YMHF), over 25 student ambassadors were trained to support recruitment across 15 college campuses through digital dissemination, poster drives, classroom briefings, and student society collaborations.
- As part of wider engagement, Sangath and YMHF co-hosted the inaugural METROPOLIS
  youth mental health festival, CONFAB in New Delhi. The festival was attended by over 500
  students, and featured interactive booths, games, talks, workshops, and an exhibition of
  personal mental health narratives.
- The METROPOLIS outreach further amplified through the launch of a dedicated METROPOLIS website <a href="https://www.metropolisstudy.com">www.metropolisstudy.com</a>.

**SMHPP:** Under **new initiative, a cluster-level exhibition** was organised, showcasing students' talents through competitions held across the year on intervention themes.

Orientation programs were conducted for 120 primary school heads on mental health, stress management, and their responsibilities under the POCSO Act (Protection of Children from Sexual Offenses), as well as for 19 secondary school heads on program deliverables, mental health, and POCSO Act awareness. The SEHER intervention is now being adapted and evaluated for students in Tokyo, Japan and Bradford, UK.

In collaboration with the Department of Education, PMC, a workshop was held for 300 primary school heads, focusing on mental wellbeing, stress management, self-care strategies, and the importance of creating stigma-free, sensitized school environments. A formal MoU was signed with PCMC, further strengthening program delivery.

**PRESENCE:** Gatekeeper trainings were conducted across different communities in Rajasthan & Madhya Pradesh, to build awareness and skills for suicide prevention. Mainstream and sports teachers received training on key mental health topics, while parents, teachers, and community youth were sensitized on mental health issues and effective coping mechanisms.

We are committed to transforming adult mental health by deepening the understanding of both common and severe mental disorders. Through cutting-edge research and collaboration across psychology, psychiatry, neuroscience, and public health, we uncover new insights and design innovative interventions that matter in the real world.

By working hand-in-hand with clinicians, policymakers, and communities, we bridge the gap between research and practice—ensuring that evidence-informed care is more accessible, impactful, and life-changing for adults facing mental health challenges.



#### PROJECTS UNDER ADULT MENTAL HEALTH

**AANAND:** A randomized controlled trial on the effectiveness of a positive psychology-based coaching intervention for community health workers, to improve their delivery of treatment for depression in rural India.

**OptimizeD:** A precision mental health randomized clinical trial aimed at improving outcomes in moderate to severe depression in primary care in India.

**SHARP:** Aims to reduce the mental health treatment gap in low and middle-income countries (LMICs) by providing remote support to persons living with severe mental health conditions such as schizophrenia (in particular) by predicting and managing relapse in tertiary care outpatients.

**SAHARA:** A program designed to promote perinatal psychosocial wellbeing and nurturing care from pregnancy through the first three years of life, in select districts of Madhya Pradesh. It aims to assess the feasibility, acceptability, implementation, and impact of an integrated intervention on women's mental health and Early Child Development (ECD).

**SAATHI:** Aims to co-produce a digital curriculum to train peer support workers supporting individuals with severe mental illness.

**IMPRESS:** Implementation of evidence-based facility and community interventions to reduce the treatment gap for depression. It aims to reduce the treatment gap for depression by addressing both supply and demand side barriers through two scalable models in Goa.

**PracticePal:** Aims to improve treatment outcomes for individuals undergoing Healthy Activity Program (HAP) treatment for depression by means of a chatbot- aimed to improve adherence to homework in HAP therapy in MP & Goa.

**KhusheeMamta:** A non-specialist-delivered perinatal depression intervention in rural Rajasthan, adapted from the WHO 'Thinking Healthy Program'.

**PEERS:** Aims to test a peer-supervision mobile application and understand its impact on the quality of therapy, delivered by non-specialist community healthcare workers.

#### **COMMUNITY BASED HEALTH INITIATIVES**

Under OptimizeD, awareness and sensitisation sessions were held in primary health centers and shelter homes, focusing on early identification and management of depression, particularly in underserved settings.

**SAHARA** has been championing Maternal Mental Health Awareness through innovative community-based public engagement tools such as **street plays and wall paintings** in 8 districts of Madhya Pradesh. Hundreds of **THPP (Thinking Healthy Program Peer) sessions** were delivered to antenatal and postnatal women who were screened positive for perinatal depression.

Through a range of innovative initiatives, Sangath continued to strengthen community-based responses to mental health. **IMPRESS** engaged **trained volunteers to raise awareness about depression**, identify individuals in need of care, support those undergoing counselling, and practice self-care themselves—creating a compassionate support system within communities.

With **PracticePal**, the **HAP** was piloted in **Bhopal** and **Goa**, delivered by ASHA workers and trained volunteers, with a digital chatbot introduced as a therapy aid to enhance reach and engagement. Whereas, **SAATHI** created a platform for dialogue by hosting a panel discussion with peer supporters, highlighting the importance of **rights-based mental health care** and lived experience leadership.

**Khushee Mamta** brings maternal mental health care closer to women by **training lay** counsellors to screen and support mothers experiencing perinatal depression. Despite barriers like stigma and limited privacy, the program has shown that lived experience, strong collaboration, and culturally adapted care can break through these challenges—making support more accessible and empowering for mothers in the community.

#### YEARLY HIGHLIGHTS

**AANAND:** A key milestone was the development of a **character-strength-based coaching intervention**, along with the successful delivery of ten five-day residential workshops. The project also produced **two peer-reviewed publications** and an oral presentation at the **33rd International Congress of Psychology in Prague**. The presentation highlighted qualitative findings from the pilot phase, drawing on interviews with ASHAs to capture their experiences of both workshop-based and remote coaching.

**KushalMaa:** The study marked foundational milestones this year, including the recruitment of a culturally competent team of research assistants and intervention moderators with strong local familiarity

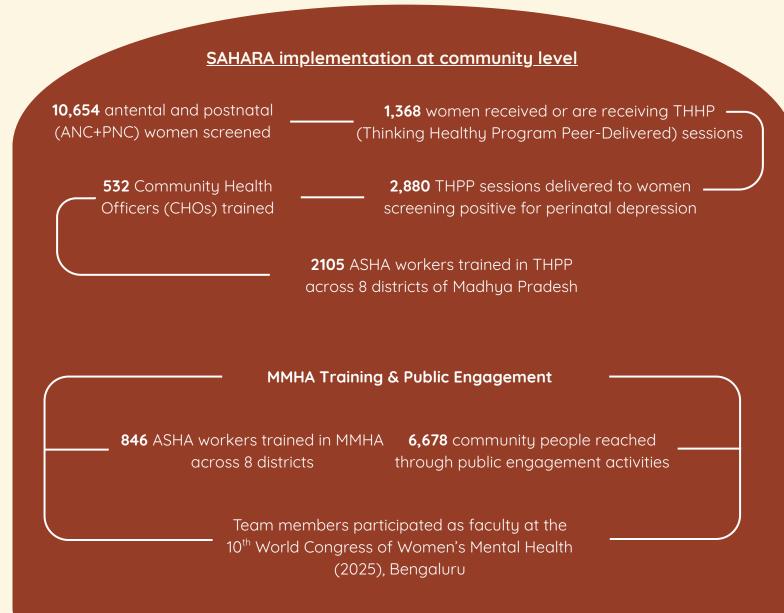
- Digital data collection systems were designed and developed using the REDCap platform, with study tools pilot-tested at the field level. Two study blocks in Sehore district were selected in coordination with district health authorities, and REDCap forms were finalized for real-time data collection.
- Formal approvals and agreements were secured, including IRB approval for the study protocol and tools, and an MoU with the National Health Mission, Madhya Pradesh. Field implementation commenced in February 2025.

**SHARP:** The project **completed its pilot phase and focus group discussions**, engaging 56 participants diagnosed with early-course schizophrenia or schizoaffective disorder. One research paper was published, and the **mindLAMP app**—developed by BIDMC, one of the study sites—is being leveraged as part of the research.

**Khushee Mamta:** Lay counsellor recruitment, training, and deployment in rural Rajasthan.

- Screened and provided psychosocial treatment for perinatal depression via lay counsellors in collaboration with community health workers- ASHAs & AWWs- for improved awareness and access to culturally adapted care.
- Utilised the **photovoice methodology and organised photo exhibitions**, while also building collaborative networks and establishing an Advisory Group to support scale-up.

SAHARA: The team developed a video on Maternal Mental Health Awareness (MMHA) in collaboration with the National Health Mission, Women and Child Development Department, and Carnegie Hall, USA.

**SAATHI:** Posters presented at International Conference of Schizophrenia, Chennai.

- Workshop on 'Peer Support for Rights-Based Mental Health Care', Goa.
- Blueprint for short videos is developed; preparation for LMS upload.

**PracticePal:** Deployed PracticePal chatbot with scripted roleplay videos and homework scheduling/reminder features to support HAP therapy.

• Collaborations with 'EMPOWER India' for training & supervision of ASHA workers and with 'Dimagi' for tech development and maintenance of chatbot using TextIt onTelegram.

**PEERS:** Developed and launched the **PEERS e-course and mobile application**.

• Trained 99 counsellors to use the PEERS app, 6 counsellors graduated as peers supervisors.



**IMPRESS:** Development of a **community intervention with 5 modules,** (LEARN, INFORM, ENGAGE, FOLLOW-UP, SELF-CARE) delivered by trained community volunteers.

Established in 2014, the **Addictions and related Research Group (ARG)** at Sangath is dedicated to advancing research on addictions and mental health in low-resource settings. Collaborating closely with governments, communities, lay health counsellors, and other stakeholders, the group strives to enhance access to mental healthcare.

Originating as a small team in Goa focused on addiction, the group has expanded into a dynamic collective of over 100 members. Its research portfolio now encompasses areas such as gender-based violence, digital interventions, and implementation science. The group's initiatives extend across multiple states, including Rajasthan and Karnataka, aiming to create lasting social impact.

#### PROJECT UNDER ADDICTIONS

**CCAP:** The Coordinated Care for Alcohol Problems aims to develop and implement a contextually relevant, scalable, and coordinated intervention for problem drinking in Goa.

#### YEARLY HIGHLIGHTS

**CCAP:** Development of a **common counselling manual** with integrated evidence-based engagement strategies for harmful and dependent levels of problem drinking.

- Development of the **digital intervention M-BIT** for hazardous drinking.
- Engagement with Directorate of Health Services (DHS), Goa, to implement the intervention in primary healthcare settings.
- One peer viewed publication.





Sangath's commitment to Health Equity grew from the stark inequities exposed during the COVID-19 pandemic, particularly those faced by activists from trans and disability communities.

Through Initiative for Health Equity, Advocacy, and Research (iHEAR), we collaborate with partner organisations and community members with lived experiences, using participatory approaches that put voices from the margins at the centre. iHEAR works at the intersections of healthcare, vaccine access, medical education, and mental health—partnering with LGBTQIA+ and disability communities. By blending research with humanities, art, and innovation, we strive to reimagine systems of care that are inclusive, equitable, and just.

#### PROJECTS UNDER IHEAR

**AffirmCare**: AffirmCare Kerala aims to build the capacity of medical educators and students across 5 institutions in Kerala to provide LGBTQIA+ affirmative healthcare.

**RainbowMed:** Aims at promoting **LGBTQIA+ affirmative healthcare education** in India, with a focus on western India.

**Creative Communion:** Aims to alleviate minority stress and improve mental health by **fostering** a safe community for marginalized individuals in Bhopal, especially those from LGBTQIA+ and neurodivergent communities.

Mahei X iHEAR: Aims to strengthen the psychological and economic resilience of a cohort of 50 young women, queer, and trans individuals in Moirang, and adjoining areas in Manipur, India

**DICC 2.0:** Aims to equip a cohort of health-professional educators (HPEs) to **train medical students on disability competencies** through the use of **arts-based methods**-poetry, graphic medicine, disability ethics, and Theater of the Oppressed.

**Queer Chronicles:** The project collected **first-hand experiences of LGBTQIAP+ persons** across India, within health and healthcare settings.

Access Matters: A participatory action research project that aims to make public health facilities more accessible and inclusive for people with disabilities.

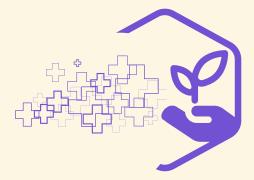
**TransMHPrep:** A qualitative participatory research project, aims to develop best practices in **trans-affirmative mental health care** provision during public health emergencies.

**TransNET:** Participatory research project, that explores how transgender, non-binary and gender-diverse (TNBGD) individuals use digital technologies in their everyday lives, especially in the context of safety and access to support.

**VaccinEquity:** A mixed methods research study to develop and test a survey tool to understand **behavioural and social drivers of COVID-19 vaccine uptake** in the transgender, gender diverse, intersex and disability communities.



#### **COMMUNITY BASED HEALTH INITIATIVES**



Sangath's work to advance LGBTQIA+ affirmative health care placed community voices at the heart of the process. By partnering with grassroot organisations like Amigos Trans Collective, Oasis Cultural Society, and Abhinaya Cultural Society, iHEAR AffirmCare ensured that training workshops reflected lived experiences and local realities. The project introduced faculty and students not only to the legal and policy landscape in Kerala but also to inspiring Community Based Organisations-led initiatives, deepening their understanding of inclusive care. Through consultations and workshops, community voices shaped the content, creating safe spaces for dialogue and learning. The project concluded with a refined set of competencies-available in simplified Hindi and English-marking an important step toward more inclusive and equitable medical education.

In Mumbai, the **TransMHPrep** team brought together community members, Civil Society Organisations, and healthcare representatives for a consultation on **best practices in transaffirmative care**, fostering dialogue through panels and group discussions.

Sangath's initiatives this year also addressed the intertwined challenges of mental health, economic well-being, and systemic exclusion faced by gueer and trans communities.

In Manipur, **Mahei team** (a youth-led skill building and economic generation centre for women, queer and trans), with support from The Collective Trust, and iHEAR Sangath, facilitated mental health workshops alongside skill-building trainings in indigenous crafts such as handloom, embroidery, potloi, and bridal make-up. These efforts not only mapped community mental health needs but also created sustainable networks for livelihood and resilience.

Together, these initiatives marked critical steps in amplifying marginalised voices, embedding lived experience into practice, and creating pathways of care, equity, and resistance across both physical and digital spaces.

#### YEARLY HIGHLIGHTS

RainbowMed: Held a sensitisation workshop at Medical College in Bhopal with faculty from multiple medical disciplines; alongside an LGBTQIA+ community consultation to integrate lived experiences into discussions on affirmative healthcare and competency review. An online workshop on LGBTQIA+ inclusivity in medical education engaged participants from 18 states, contributing to national dialogue on embedding LGBTQIA+ healthcare within the Competency-Based Medical Education (CBME) curriculum.

**Creative Communion:** Held a series of creative workshops in Bhopal, beginning with two "Theatre of the Oppressed" workshops, followed by a writing workshop at Sangath Bhopal, for colleagues interested in exploring different aspects of writing, and a Dance Movement Therapy workshop; the final workshop in the series focused on mixed-art therapy. These workshops created a safe and inclusive space, enabling participants to share experiences openly, and were highly interactive, fostering both personal and collective growth.

**Queer Chronicles:** A two-days **introductory workshop** at UCMS, Delhi, engaged 20 LGBTQIAP+ community members from across India, orienting them to three creative methods under the guidance of experienced mentors. Followed by an **online reflective writing workshop** for participants from South & Northeast India and a **zine-making workshop** in Bhopal .

With feedback from mentors and peers, the participants' work was refined into 18 first-person narratives, which were showcased at the iHEAR National Symposium on Health Humanities in Delhi & attended by 110 stakeholders. The finalised narratives were subsequently shared via iHEAR's social media, reaching a wider online audience.

Access Matters: The project engaged public hospital administrators, civil engineers under the National Health Mission (Bhopal), and various CBOs across Goa & Bhopal. Trainings for Field Investigators were conducted leading to the completion of 35 audits-24 in Madhya Pradesh and 11 in Goa.

**TransNET:** The project **completed 15 qualitative interviews** with trans, non-binary, and gender-diverse (TNBGD) individuals from diverse intersections across India. **An article reflecting on the process of conducting feminist research** was published. A **community consultation in Bangalore** was held to share preliminary findings and gather input for developing the toolkit and research dissemination.

**TransMHprep:** Prelimnary findings were presented at the 2024 MSF Scientific Days Conference and a Community consultation in Mumbai. The project conducted 20 qualitative interviews with mental health professionals, civil society representatives, lawyers, and peer supporters across India who provided psychosocial support to the trans community during the pandemic. An article on resilience, co-authored with two community advisory members, was published.

VaccinEquity: The team adapted the 'WHO Behavioral and Social Drivers of COVID-19 Vaccination survey' through a participatory process and completed 236 surveys with individuals from the trans and disability communities. Findings were shared via a bilingual webinar in Hindi and English.

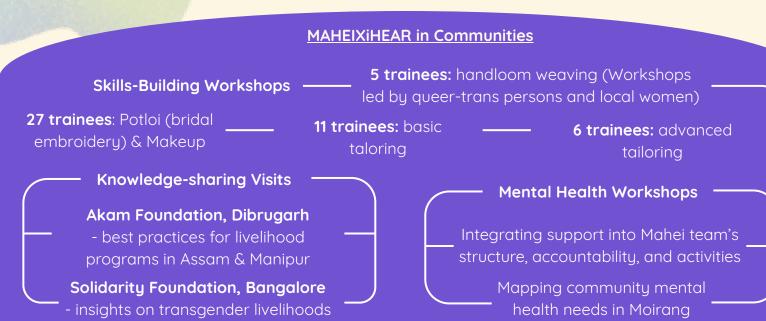
DICC 2.0: A total of 58 medical faculty, from diverse colleges and specializations across Maharashtra University of Health Sciences (MUHS), were trained in health humanities methods to teach disability competencies. Participants attended workshops on Poetry, Graphic Medicine, Disability Ethics, and Theater of the Oppressed, facilitated by experts from UChicago, University College of Medical Sciences, Delhi, Jamia Hamdard University, Delhi, and the iHEAR Sangath Bhopal Hub.

- 13 faculty members piloted these methods at their institutions with around 560 healthcare students, integrating disability-inclusive competencies into foundational courses for MBBS, physiotherapy, and nursing students.
- The project culminated in a national dissemination conference-Advancing Queer and Disability Inclusion- iHEAR National Symposium on Health Humanities.

AffirmCare: A consultation meeting with eight LGBTQIA+ community members and experts in Kerala was held to identify key challenges, opportunities, and priorities. Faculty and student workshops were conducted across medical colleges in Kozhikode, Wayanad, and Trivandrum.

 Developed Ningalude Paripalanathile Nirabhedangal (Kerala LGBTQIA+ Medical Educator Guide) with active participation from community members, enriched by lived experience sharing and collaborations with local CBOs, student groups, and the State Health Systems Resource Center-Kerala

**MAHEIXIHEAR:** The Mahei team, with The Collective Trust and iHEAR Sangath, **conducted mental health workshops to assess the needs of Moirang's queer and trans community** and explore integrating support into the team's structure, accountability, and daily activities.

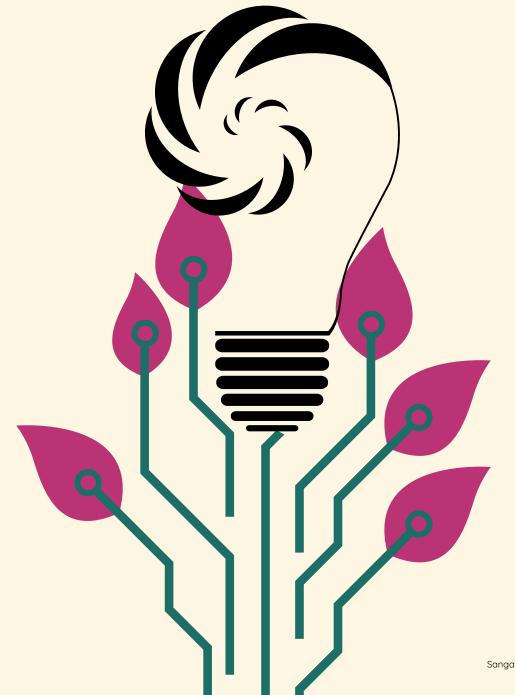

# TECHAND INNOVATIONS



This year, Sangath harnessed the power of technology to expand access, strengthen delivery, and reimagine the future of mental health care. From mobile apps to Al-driven chatbots, our teams collaborated with global and local tech partners to design tools that bring interventions closer to people, wherever they are.

#### Sangth's Innovating Care through Technology: Highlights

**M-BIT**: A WhatsApp-based brief intervention to support individuals with hazardous drinking.

**Peers App**: Mobile tool (with Dimagi) enabling peer-delivered mental health interventions.

**PracticePal**: Chatbot integrating therapy workbooks, videos, and homework reminders.

**SAATHI Digital Curriculum**: Peer supporter training curriculum hosted on an LMS, for easy access.

**DEEP**: Gamified cognitive assessment tool for young children, delivered by frontline workers.

**STREAM**: Integrated digital platform combining DEEP, START, and parental questionnaires.

**COINCIDE**: Piloting DEEP to address gaps in developmental surveillance.

**NAMASTE App**: Mobile/web platform for case management, delivery, and supervision in 3 languages.

**SHARP / mindLAMP**: Leveraging a global app to explore new frontiers in digital mental health.

**PEERS Mobile App**: Tracks therapy quality, progress, and client well-being in real time.

**VaccinEquity Virtual Research Tools**: Remote surveys and trainings enabling wide geographic reach.

**PracticePal**: Chatbot designed to function as therapy aid, incorporating HAP workbook content, psychoeducation videos, and automated homework reminders via Telegram/TextIt.

Health Systems: We strengthened primary care systems through suicide prevention campaigns, refresher trainings in counselling, and medical officer workshops in collaboration with AIIMS Bhopal. Lay counsellors, psychology students, ASHAs, Anganwadi workers, and volunteers were equipped with evidence-based interventions like HAP, CBT, MMHA and Self-Help Plus (SH+). Coaches, youth leaders, & peer supporters built skills to champion mental health in their communities. Built capacities of national & global professionals in mental health leadership.



**Health Equity:** Beyond health systems, Sangath **fostered creativity and inclusion through disability-focused workshops** in poetry, ethics, graphic medicine, and theatre of the oppressed, **expanding conversations from clinics to classrooms and cultural spaces**. Queer and trans communities in Manipur were trained in livelihood and mental health skills, embedding wellbeing within community structures.



Institutional capacities: We also advanced institutional capacities with accessibility audits, data collection for public health, and training in grant management (Research Management Grant, supported by DBT/Wellcome Trust India Alliance). Dissemination workshops created dialogue between government stakeholders, community organisations, and people with lived experience — ensuring research translates into action.

#### **Capacity Building Outcomes**

Our capacity-building initiatives this year highlighted both the promise of scalable, community-led models and the practical challenges of implementation across diverse contexts.

**Youth empowerment:** Youth programs such as **MeWeSports** demonstrated high feasibility and acceptability. By adapting content to be **age-appropriate**, **practice-oriented**, and **aligned with National Education Policy (NEP) 2020**, we saw youth facilitators take pride in leading campaigns, gain confidence in influencing peers, and embrace participatory methods.

**Frontline health systems: Training of frontline workers** under **NAMASTE** improved capacities in developmental screenings, though operational challenges such as competing workloads, limited digital infrastructure, and new tools (e.g., REDCap) required additional on-ground supervision and verification.

**Faculty sensitization:** Faculty sensitization workshops under **AFFIRMCARE** and **RainbowMed** showed strong outcomes, with **increase in awareness** and **readiness to integrate LGBTQIA+ affirmative competencies**.

Small-group discussions, case-based dialogue, and leadership engagement enhanced participation.

**Digital innovation:** App-based tools like **mindLAMP** showed strong adherence, quality data collection, and good correlation with psychological scales, supporting its use for cognitive assessment in schizophrenia.

**Community resilience**: **Mahei X iHEAR** workshops equipped **displaced queer and women participants** with indigenous craft, tailoring, and weaving skills, improving financial independence, cultural preservation, and psychological wellbeing. They also catalysed stronger peer networks and online community presence.

Across projects, interactive, case-based learning, peer circles, and refresher trainings proved most effective in sustaining knowledge and improving service delivery quality.

Enhancing Institutional Research Management Capacity: Established the Office of Project Management (OPM), rolled out pre- and post-award policies, launched a centralised grants database with regular funding updates, and strengthened researcher support across the grant lifecycle. Capacity was further built through trainings, intramural grants, international exposure, and a draft open-access manual—reinforcing Sangath's commitment to sustainable research management.

The 16th edition of Sangath's Leadership in Mental Health (LMH) Course brought together 70 passionate participants from 10 countries and a powerhouse faculty of over 50 global Mental Health Experts. The week-long residential bootcamp fostered deep learning, critical reflection, and cross-cultural exchange on evidence-based practices and community-driven innovations.

#### **Key Learnings**



**Simplify & Localize Content:** Interactive, participatory, and context-specific approaches build greater confidence and retention among trainees.



**Leverage Technology Wisely:** Digital tools strengthen monitoring and evaluation, but require handholding, refresher sessions, and infrastructural support to overcome barriers.



**Adapt to Local Realities:** Flexibility in timelines, sensitivity to conflict and mental health challenges, and tailored financial systems are crucial for community-led projects.



**Institutional Buy-In Matters:** Working with leadership and institutions already open to change accelerates uptake of new competencies.



Community-Led Approaches Work Best: Empowering local voices and peer networks ensures sustainability, relevance, and long-term impact.

#### **Campaigns & Advocacy**

In 2024–25, Sangath strengthened its public voice through campaigns that brought mental health into classrooms, communities, and digital spaces. From large-scale festivals to targeted toolkits, we sought to raise awareness, build acceptance, and share evidence with diverse audiences across India.

#### **Mental Health Festival & Marathon**

**PRESENCE** project sparked conversations on mental health across schools in Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan - using the power of interactive sessions, sports, and cultural events to break stigma and build supportive communities.

#### **Mental Health Awareness Month**

**OptimizeD** celebrated Mental Health Awareness Month across PHCs in Bhopal with focus on depression education, stigma reduction, and community engagement. Workplace events were held on World Mental Health Day, focusing on burnout and stress management.

#### Youth based Campaigns

College-led campaigns put students at the forefront, under **STRIDE** (Intramural) — empowering young leaders to design and drive powerful awareness initiatives on substance use, harm reduction, and overall wellbeing.

#### **Community Campaigns**

**SAHARA** project sparked conversations on Maternal Mental Health through street plays & wall paintings in Madhya Pradesh.

**IMPRESS** held a suicide prevention campaign, in collaboration with DHS Goa, wherein primary care staff in all 30 facilities were provided information on suicide prevention and how to support someone with suicidal ideation and attempts.

#### **Social Media Campaigns**

**NAMASTE** project ran a vibrant social media campaign that busted common myths and amplified voices of acceptance — fostering inclusion, understanding, and respect for autistic individuals.

**PracticePal** actively promoted access to free counselling sessions by sharing weekly updates across social media platforms (Instagram, X, and WhatsApp). The campaign was further supported by posters in public spaces, distribution of leaflets, and referrals from general practitioners in Panjim, Margao, and Vasco-Goa.

#### **Policy Engagement**

Sangath actively engaged with government bodies, health systems, and policymakers to translate research into action and strengthen mental health policies in India. Through formal dialogues, dissemination events, and collaborative pilots, we worked to embed evidence-based practices into state and national frameworks.

#### Partnership for Primary Care Integration

• **CCAP** partnered with the **Directorate of Health Services (DHS)** to embed interventions within primary healthcare settings, advancing rights-based mental health care delivery.

#### Policy Brief on Child Development

• **COINCIDE** shared a policy brief with **NHM Haryana** drawing on 10+ years of data from the SPRING cohort in Rewari, highlighting pathways **to strengthen child neurodevelopment and mental health policies**.

#### **High-Level Policy Discussions**

- **OptimizeD** engaged in formal policy dialogue with **MD-NHM Madhya Pradesh** to share trial progress and explore scale-up for vulnerable populations.
- Facilitated PHC visits with government stakeholders during the Mid-Term Collaborators' Meet at AIIMS Bhopal.

#### **Embedding Peer Supervision**

• **PEERS** worked with **DHS Goa** to integrate peer supervision into health system counselling practices, strengthening workforce support.

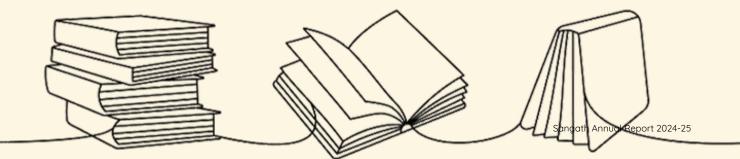
#### **Dissemination & Platform Demonstration**
